When to Seal and How to Seal:

Sealing your Granite countertops is strongly recommended. Granite is a glorious material and the differences in porosity, hardness and colours are infinite. Thus, there is no hard and fast rule on how often to seal your countertops. All granite countertops are sealed by the Stonewrights team right after the installation. Stonewrights recommends watching the areas that get the most wear and tear and then decide on sealing. A definitive method to determine the necessity for sealing your countertops is through the water beading test. This involves placing a large drop of water onto the countertop surface; if the water forms beads that remain intact for several hours or

even overnight, your countertop does not require sealing. On the other hand, if the water is absorbed into the stone, this indicates that it's time to apply a fresh coat of sealant to protect the surface.





Pro Sealant Tip:

Make sure that if there is a stain on your kitchen countertop that you do NOT seal over the stain. This will make any removal operation 10 times harder. Remember to call Stonewrights if you have a stain issue. They carry professional level, specialized stain removal products. This, combined with their decades of experience with the care of your countertops can often save the day.

Some newer Granite materials may not even need additional sealing anymore. For example: Cosentino, one of our top-quality suppliers offers SENSA Granite. This incredible stone undergoes a complete treatment that protects it for 15 years.

Cleaning and Maintenance:

The fact is, 95% of people never have a serious issue with their granite countertops, so rest easy.

This advice is from an incredibly good article from diynetwork.com:



"So, what do you do when you spill something on your Granite countertop? Immediately wipe your stone countertop with soap and water, especially if the spill material is acidic. (lemon juice for example.) Rinse the area with clean water and let dry. Make sure the water is fresh and clean, not used dishwater, for example, that could contain grease. If the stain remains the next step is to apply a poultice. A simple and safe poultice can be made by mixing 1/4 cup of baking soda with just enough water to create a paste with the consistency of sour cream. Apply the paste to the stain and keep it on overnight. If it is still there, repeat."

Cleaning and Maintenance:

Here's a fantastic breakdown on how to clean marble countertops from diynetwork.com:

"Don't use vinegar, window cleaner or bleach on marble. A single use of these acidic substances will eat into a marble countertop's surface and dull the stone. Don't use abrasive cleaner or pads, either, because marble can be scratched. A secret in knowing how to clean marble countertops: You don't need specialty cleaners for marble. Mild soap and hot water will do just fine. Wipe sudsy water on the counter with a soft cloth or sponge. This will remove dirt but won't heal any etching or stains." You can give your marble a little protection from stains and etching by using a 3 in 1 formula that Stonewrights has available and which cleans, protects and polishes.




Additional to the spray, a sealer needs to be regularly applied. The scheduling of this procedure is dependent on different factors from the marble itself and usage. It is recommended to consult with your trusted dealer. You're still going to have to wipe up spills immediately to avoid damage, but the sealant will give you a little more time to mop before the staining starts.

What is "etching"?

Here is a great answer from Holly Mathis Interiors:

"It's just a colorless looking watermark. Often wiping down with a warm cloth they go away. I think it's important to dry them as well if possible. Water spots might wipe away but acidic things like lemons or pickles or tomatoes can etch more permanently."





You can minimize the risk of etching by sealing your marble countertops regularly, as stated before, but the best method is ensuring you do not put any potential problem items directly on your countertop. Using coasters, cutting boards and being quick to wipe up spills is your best bet.

There is a strong possibility you will get permanent etching on marble. If you are a type "A" personality, then potentially rethink your choice of marble. If you are more of a "stuff happens" type of person, marble may just be for you.

Marble demands a commitment from you to protect and maintain it religiously. In return, you get a heritage quality countertop your friends will envy and you will love. The bottom line is to never try and "fix" a problem yourself. Talk to your trusted fabricator.

Honed vs Polished finish: Honed marble is marble that has not gone through the polishing process. This results in the stone having a matte appearance, rather than the distinctive shine of polished marble. Many homeowners choose honed marble because of its natural look. "A honed marble countertop will not be as reflective as one that is polished", advises Marble.com. One note, a honed surface will scratch easier than a polished one.

- "White is best for hiding acid etchings that usually leave a whiteish mark" says Architectualdigest.com
- Take veining patterns into account. If you see something you like, make sure it is still available by checking with your fabricator.
- Make sure to deal with trusted countertop companies that have stood the test of time and will buy quality marble for your project.

One example is Carrara marble. It is very common and often one of the most cost-effective marbles available. Check with your supplier for different types of marble with different porosity and density.

Soapstone contains talc and this accounts for the softer feel and silky appearance. Soapstone's color spectrum can be affected by oiling and waxing the surface. When oiled it can begin as a light grey color and go all the way to dark grey, dark green or black. Oiling or waxing Soapstone enhances the natural aging process and gives it a more consistent appearance over the whole countertop. Soapstone will naturally darken over time as well.

Living with Soapstone

You have to be prepared to "baby" your new Soapstone countertop a bit. In the beginning you may have to oil your Soapstone a few times a month before tapering off as it ages.

A bit of vigilance will ensure your family a heritage quality countertop your friends will envy and you will love.

Use cutting boards and be careful of dropping heavy pans on it for example. (Good advice for all types of countertops actually.)

As stated above, Soapstone will darken overtime as a patina develops. Some people love this and some do not. Be aware this WILL happen when deciding if Soapstone is for you.

Soapstone is a viable choice for any kitchen. It has different levels of hardness depending on its talc content. Less talc means a harder stone that is more suitable for kitchen countertops and the wear and tear they endure.

Soapstone is non-porous, this means no sealant is needed and spills of wine are not going to stain your countertops. (Still be sure to wipe up spills promptly.)

Soap and water are all the cleaning necessary for this remarkable stone.

Soapstone starts at a mid-level price and then goes up from there. Pricing may depend on where it is quarried (Brazil vs North America for example). We work with Brazilian Soapstone and Alberene Soapstone quarried by Canadian company Polycor in Virginia USA.

Pricing is on a square foot basis as for all natural stones. We like to work out the project details before quoting natural stone. Different size slabs or distinctive patterns can alter the potential price depending on installation parameters and clients' special requests.



You will need to contact your dealer to see the size options available. You may have to order samples as well as most dealers do not stock a vast variety of Soapstone slabs.
